COMMUNITY PARTNER HIGH FIVES

On Wednesday, August 27th, one of the hottest days of the year, one of the HVAC units at the House of Bread



and Peace quit working. The next day, ECHO sent out a press release and social media requests to begin an urgent campaign to raise \$6000+ to replace the 24-year-old unit.

Immediately, four of our local media outlets contacted us to help get the word out. Many community partners and advocates started sharing the urgent need on their social media feeds. Before we knew it, donations from the community started pouring in.

One of our dedicated partners, Jessica, walked into **Schmitt Refrigeration**, a local, woman-owned business, and told the story of our emergency shelter for homeless women and women with children. Without skipping beat, Schmitt came over, looked at the old unit, and went back to see if they had a unit to replace it. Sure enough, not only did they have a unit, they decided to donate it to the House!

The next day, Allison and Arley, owners of Schmitt Refrigeration, stopped by the House with a basket of treats. They wanted to say "hi," meet us face to face, and learn more about the House. As it turned out, the love and support continued. Koch, a business that Schmitt works with, became involved in the project and has pledged to make a financial contribution to the House through the **Koch Foundation**.

Both Allison and Arley said they knew it would feel good to do something like this, but they did not realize it would feel THIS good. While they greatly appreciate the shout-outs and good publicity, it really makes their hearts feel good to be helpful.

By Friday morning, Schmitt Refrigeration was at The House installing the new unit. While they were there, we noticed a second unit had quit working. Thanks to our

generous community, we will have the funds to get it diagnosed and see what we need to do to have a fully functioning HVAC system; keeping the women and children who are depending on The House safe in a healthy environment.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT Initiatives with Impact

Merrick Korach, our Community Development Director, has been meeting with numerous community partners who are coming together to develop *The Community Collaborative*, an initiative that unites stakeholders in a trust-based network to elevate quality of life and create flourishing communities. We are working with a 3rd party software company to implement a mapping tool that will define and diagram stakeholder relationships. The goal of this project is to identify the strengths and gaps in services our community offers in the areas of economic, physical, and social development. Examples would include access to healthy food, education, childcare, housing, and jobs.
