Since childhood, Christi has dreamed of serving her country in the Navy. In 2001, she made that dream a reality, completing boot camp just before the tragic events of 9/11. Trained as a missile technician, she thrived on the adventure of exploring new places but struggled to be taken seriously as a woman in a male-dominated field.

By 2005, Christi transitioned to civilian life—a journey filled with challenges. Determined to ease the path for others, she founded Worthy Warriors Ministry in Kentucky to support Veterans navigating life after service.

In 2021, everything changed when a tornado devastated Hopkins County, Kentucky. Christi, who was tirelessly aiding others, lost her own home. Left with no viable housing,

she spent nine months in an unlivable house before securing an apartment through the Housing Authority. However, in time, her brain injury and trauma cost her that stability. For two years, Christi and her service dog endured the cycle of homelessness, from motels to the streets, to nights in a friend's car.

The weight of guilt, shame, and isolation grew unbearable. Reflecting on that period, Christi shared, "When you've spent so much time by yourself with your dog on the streets, it becomes difficult to face other people. The fear of judgment and the uncertainty of safety keep you wanting to hide."

In June 2024, a fellow Veteran extended a lifeline—a phone number for Adam at ECHO's Homeless Veteran Reintegration Program (HVRP). It took three months for Christi to summon the courage to call, but that call marked the beginning of her transformation.

Christi discovered a team of Veterans who understood her struggles. "They showed compassion," she said. "That's why I came back." Together, they mapped out goals tailored to her pace, addressing medical, mental, housing, and employment needs. When asked, "What will it take for you to be happy?" Christi found a safe space to dream again.

Today, Christi stands in a place she once thought unattainable. "For the first time in seven years, I feel free. I have my own home, my own life, and the ability to be myself. I can walk into a room and not feel intimidated, deficient, worthless, or disabled. HVRP has been patient and worked hard on my behalf so I could begin to work on my own behalf."

Christi's story is a testament to resilience, the power of support, and the transformative impact of programs like HVRP.
